Pop on the Box - A History of Pop Music on British Television Jeff Evans Monday 9 February 2026, 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre. Following Jeff's entertaining talk on the history of children's TV, he will be making a return visit. Freelance journalist and television historian Jeff Evans, author of *Rock & Pop on British TV* (Omnibus Press), tells the intriguing story of 60 years of music on television in this fully illustrated talk, beginning in the 1950s with shows such as *Six-Five Special* and *Oh Boy!* and continuing through the decades with programmes including *Juke Box Jury*, *Thank Your Lucky Stars*, *Ready, Steady, Go!*, *Top of the Pops* and *The Old Grey Whistle Test*, as well as a number of programmes that you may just have forgotten. When local historians Noel Ponting and Graham Carter looked into the association for Moonies in London, they made some surprising discoveries, revealing a fresh insight into social life in the early 20th century.

January 2026 Monthly Meeting Report

Light in the Darkest Hour – Dunkirk's Little Ships

Our first speaker of 2026 was Maritime Historian and former Royal Marine, Paul Barnett. Growing up in Gloucestershire, his interest in maritime history began when he first saw the beached vessels at Purton on the River Severn.

The period 28 May to 4 June 1940 is claimed to be the country's Darkest Hour, with British troops needing to be evacuated from mainland Europe. Winston Churchill's target was to get around 45,000 troops home, but by the 'miracle of Dunkirk', 338,226 were evacuated successfully. This included 139,997 French, Polish, Belgian and a small number of Dutch soldiers, yet within 2 weeks, the free French had managed to return to Europe to continue their fight.

In Flemish, Dunkirk means 'church in the dunes' and it was the sand dune system that helped shield troops against intense German aerial bombing and artillery fire, allowing soldiers to wait for rescue.

Paul dispelled many myths surrounding the evacuation. One was that the halt order came directly from Hitler due to his admiration of the British, whereas it was more likely a question of logistics with Panzer divisions needing fuel, ammunition and infantry to catch up.

Another myth surrounds the 851 boats that sailed from Ramsgate to Dunkirk for the evacuation. Whilst some were undoubtedly small private boats manned by civilians, the majority were much larger, eg steam and cargo ships, paddle steamers, fireboats and lifeboats.

Another myth questions where the RAF were in all of this. They were doing sterling work but many RAF ground crew were turned on by their Army comrades and were forced to take uniforms from dead soldiers in order to be accepted for evacuation.

Paul gave us some amazing statistics. Amongst the equipment left behind were 20,000 motorcycles and 65,000 motor cars and lorries!

The evacuation was indeed 'the miracle of Dunkirk'.

It was at this very site during World War Two where British Codebreakers, including Alan Turing, worked to uncover the secrets of the Enigma machine and break enemy codes, providing vital intelligence that had a direct impact on the war.

See one of the largest collections of Enigma machines on public display anywhere in the world. Discover more about the amazing people who worked here and their captivating stories, and marvel at their feats of ingenuity.

Movie-buffs out there may recognise the story of Turing from the 2014 film, *The Imitation Game*, starring Benedict Cumberbatch.

It's a profound and eye-opening tale that Bletchley Park does the ultimate justice towards by preserving it to this day.

Life, the Universe and Everything

In January the Life, the Universe and Everything group hosted Ben Bell from Plastic Free Swindon (<https://plasticfreeswindon.org/>).

Ben's presentation generated a lot of questions and comments, and was very well received. It was heartening that so many of our group were willing to accept that we can all do more to reduce the harm to our planet.

There are a lot of greener alternatives that we can adopt, and Ben shocked many of us with the facts and statistics surrounding the vast production of plastic bottles, and the fact that most plastic recycling is actually plastic disposal in a harmful way.

For instance, I was unaware that modern vehicle tyres contain a lot of plastics, that wool is rarely wool because it contains other synthetic materials, and that when a large corporation claims to be helping the planet, they are usually paying lip-service to the green lobby and actually doing nothing of value.

If you're interested in doing a little more for the planet and our children's futures, Plastic Free Swindon have a wealth of knowledge and experience that can help us all to make small (or large) changes to our lifestyles that can make a difference.

Climate Change Group

Storm Goretti has reminded us that extreme weather events are continuing. Cornwall experienced gales battering the county of up to 99 miles per hour. Heavy rains have affected many parts of the UK since with some flooding where the ground has been saturated.

Our first session in January we studied Food Security, looking at the vulnerability of food supplies due to drought, floods and storms in this country and globally. The complicated and often long-distance food supply chains can be disrupted leading to food shortages, especially if no strategic stocks have been built up.

We also looked at Energy/Power supply which is at the heart of our industrial society and essential for our very survival. The over dependence upon fossil fuels, the transition to renewables and the pros and cons of different forms of electricity generation and other technologies being developed.

In February we are having sessions on Transport, Housing and Economics/Finance and the implications of climate change on these sectors.

U3a Travel group visit to Amazon Fulfilment Centre, Symmetry Park, Swindon
Utterly fascinating and mind-boggling tour of this huge facility with our u3a Travel group Monday January 5th. It's the size of 7 football pitches and covers the processes from delivery by suppliers to packing and labelling the final orders. We watched items arrive in the space, be stored and retrieved then moved to the packing area. Conveyor belts move items around the space at speed. We learned the meaning of the logo – the arrow goes from A to Z which is where they can deliver. The fastest delivery was in the USA delivered by drone in 30 minutes from order! They plan to trial drone delivery in some areas of the UK soon, sadly not Swindon! Why do the storage arrangements appear so chaotic? They are very logical when explained! Staff are offered various benefits such as education, health care, reduced price bus travel.

As new ways of doing things emerge, Amazon adapts. Various instances were explained to us e.g. more environmentally suitable collapsable packaging
