Thank you for the wealth of feedback which I will use to help forward planning for next year. Gill Brain


Promoting Swindon u3a near you

Report on 'Good Hare Days'



The first meeting of the new term saw wildlife photographer David Bailey making a return visit. He promised we would be mesmerised and we were!

Self-taught in photography, David has gained the Brand Laureate Award (equivalent to a Grammy) for his work.

Chance meetings with Dr Rhys Jones of Cardiff University and star of the BBC series 'Rhys Jones Wildlife Patrol' led to David being asked to film some owls – after which he was told he was joining the production team. BBC's Springwatch and ITV's Coast and Country programmes followed.

For years David has had a fascination with hares. Their moods can reflect ours; bad tempered, funny, relaxed, perplexed, determined or just plain lazy.

As David photographs on a working farm, the yearly planting of crops in different fields dictates where he will find the most hares. Tractors don't seem to bother them, but harvest time must be a real shock, imagine going to work in the morning and returning in the evening, only to find your home gone!

David's photographs were stunning and included a sequence of boxing hares photographed with a camera that can take twenty images a second. That took three years of intensive work to capture.

While waiting for hares, other wildlife makes the occasional appearance including deer, hen harriers, barn owls, kestrels and stoats, all of which can make the day extra special.

But capturing such beautiful images really comes down to getting out of bed at 3.00 am to lay flat on the ground with a good supply of food and drink!

Climate Change Group

The Swindon u3a Climate change group has got off to a flying start this term. With the very hot summer and drought we have just experienced which the UK Met. Office report of 28/8/25 described is "the hottest summer ever", plus the world-wide extreme weather events which have continued apace with wild fires and floods increasing, it's no wonder that people are now beginning to realise the seriousness of the situation.

Our first session looked at the basic science and the terminology and jargon used in climatology with lively discussion accompanying this.

In future sessions we will be looking at the effects of climate change, mitigation and adaptation, as well as the UN IPCC programmes such as the 2015 Paris Agreement (COP 26) and the forthcoming COP 30 in November 2025 in Brazil. Finally climate breakdown and collapse (unless measures are taken to prevent this).

Travel Group G Report on Visit to Newcastle

We had a really memorable and busy trip to Newcastle in September 2025, visiting many different venues during our stay.

On the way we visited Wollaton Hall, owned by Nottingham City Estate, originally a family country house with a deer park, now Nottinghamshire's Natural History Museum set in a huge parkland area.

Beamish was our first full day in the area. A

living museum set in huge grounds. Many of us had been before, but each time you visit there are different things. Some of the highlights included, seeing the vacuum shoot work to send cash from shop to cashier in the Co-op, fish and chips, ride on a vintage tram or bus and going down the drift mine, bent double! One of our group realised when she visited the school that it was the one that her mum attended! There was a photo opportunity of The Angel of the North on the way back to the hotel.

Bamburgh Castle was another fascinating place to visit. It has amazing sea views and the day was clear. Our tour guide gave us some of the history of the many people who had lived there, explaining that it wasn't always good to be a monarch in past times – usually killed!!

Then we moved on to Lindisfarne. people visited the castle, Priory, local church, the beach or just sat and enjoyed an ice cream and the views back over the causeway to Bamburgh. Seals basked as we left, apparently, they are females waiting to pup at this time of year.

Next morning was atmospheric to say the least. Our visit to Housesteads was in the rain! It did not deter many of us. Later we visited Hexham, a small market town full of charm. Lunch and visits to the Abbey, shops, a Sci FI exhibition were enjoyed. On our return to Newcastle, we met a tour guide who gave us a fascinating insight into Newcastle, its history, important buildings including the castle, cathedrals, iconic bridges, football ground and people. Some of us stayed with her for a walking tour. This whetted our appetite for the following day, a free day.

Free day included: train to Durham Cathedral, Metro to the coast, Laing art gallery, Hancock Museum and mooching round the shops – there is an original M&S Penny Bazaar in Grainger Market!

For our last day, we visited Alnwick Castle. So much to see and do. The Castle, the ornate gardens, including the Poison Garden; a fascinating place to have a guided tour. Some plants are so toxic they are in cages. We also saw the water features, three museums and enjoyed coffee and ice creams.

On our way home, we had a food stop at Wetherby service station then on to Kedleston Hall, now owned by the National Trust. It is vast and very ornate! It was built to outdo Chatsworth House, another local county estate home. As we boarded the coach for the last time, I asked a passerby to take a group photo. He was very personable and attentive. As he left, he told us he's a wedding photographer!!

In the evenings we had time to walk around Newcastle before we dined. Later we had a few quizzes to challenge our brains, organised by Phil!

One comment made by all of us, the hospitality of the local people was amazing, they were all very proud to showcase their venues. Several of the group planned to meet family and friends whilst in the area. They missed some of the trips, but had a good time.

Life in a poem

Sara Trevor Teasdale (1884 – 1933) was an American lyrical poet. Born in St. Louis Missouri, she suffered ill health in her childhood years and had to be home-schooled. In her adult years, she refused a marriage to Vachel Lindsay, the poet, who felt he could not provide her with financial stability. In 1914, she chose to marry Ernst Filsinger, a longtime admirer of her poetry. This proved a lonely union. She filed for divorce which, along with the earlier suicide of Lindsey, partly contributed to her own death by overdose. In 1917, she won a Pulitzer Prize for her poetry collection Love Songs. This beautiful example of her work is an anti-war poem which sadly, is still relevant in current times.

There Will Come Soft Rains

There will come soft rains and the smell of the ground,

And swallows circling with their shimmering sound;

And frogs in the pools singing at night, And wild plum trees in tremulous white,

Robins will wear their feathery fire Whistling their whims on a low fence-wire;

And not one will know of the war, not one Will care at last when it is done.

Not one would mind, neither bird nor tree If mankind perished utterly;

And Spring herself, when she woke at dawn, Would scarcely know that we were gone.
